Executive Summary

The Chisholm Trail 100 Club, Inc. is a growing network of people working together to provide financial support and encouragement to survivors of eligible law enforcement officers, fire-fighters, correctional officers and emergency medical service personnel who are killed or seriously injured in the line of duty within our area of operation, Johnson County and Somervell County, Texas. The Club is a citizen sponsored not-for-profit organization created to support the families of First Responder personnel and is funded only by its member dues (e.g. Annual memberships, Lifetime Memberships, etc.) and general donations from the public.

When tragedy strikes the effects can be both swift and devastating. The 100 Club recognizes the need to respond immediately with personal support and understanding. Whatever the need, be it financial, advisory, or moral support, the 100 Club will be there to ease the pain of the family of a firefighter, law enforcement officer, correctional officer or EMS (Emergency Medical Service) responder injured or killed in the line of duty.

Historical Background

The idea of the first 100 Club began in Detroit, Michigan, in 1952, after a local businessman, William Packer, was moved to action when a police officer was killed in the line of duty. Packer, a friend of the Police Commissioner, wrote to 100 of his friends, encouraging them to donate to a fund for the fallen officer's family to get them through the emotionally and financially trying time. The response was 100% positive. Packer and the Commissioner later met with the expectant widow, reviewed her finances, arranged to pay off the mortgage on their recently purchased home, pay all the bills, set up an education account for the yet unborn child and deposited \$7,000 in the widow's checking account.

These caring and unselfish actions became the charter for what is now nationally known as "The 100 Club". Over the last 50 years, 100 clubs have been started in cities in every state of the nation and members now number into the tens of thousands.

The Chisholm Trail 100 Club is the newest member to join the other Texas 100 Clubs: The 100 Club, The 100 Club of Southeast Texas and the 100 Club of Central Texas. As clubs grew, their missions expanded and changed. Many clubs have elected to include Fire Fighters and EMS Personnel; some have even begun providing stipends to qualified agencies to purchase equipment to enhance the safety of their personnel.

The 100 Club Members realize that money can never make up for the loss of or disability of a loved one, but it can be helpful in covering immediate expenses. In addition, the 100 Club has a committee of experts, a Professional Advisory Team including members of the Fallen Officers' Agency, CPAs, attorneys, trust officers, brokers, financial consultants and employee benefits consultants. This team, at the survivor's request, will advise and counsel the family in a wide range of areas without cost or obligation.

If you are a civic minded individual and support the 100 Club mission, there is a place for you among this group of extraordinary people. Membership in the 100 Club is open to everyone and provides minimum effort and maximum satisfaction. We simply want to help those who are always there to protect us.

Meet Our Award Winners

Lifetime Achievement Award — N. H. Laseman

Johnson County District Attorney's Office



N.H. Laseman has been a law enforcement officer for over 50 years, joining the Cleburne Police Department in 1964 after being discharged from the Marines serving in Camp Pendleton, Cambodia, Thailand and Vietnam. In 2011 N.H. retired from the CPD and joined the Johnson County District Attorney's Office as an investigator. N.H. has earned a reputation for being a hard worker with unquestionable integrity, with a knack for earning the trust of anyone around him, including witnesses. He is also recognized as having an amazing memory, able to recall details from cases decades ago with amazing clarity. As retired Johnson County Sheriff, Bob Alford, once said, "He's the epitome of what a police officer ought to be." N.H. has slowed down some in his later years, now running only three miles a day, as opposed to his usual five a day, but he remains completely dedicated to police work, often serving to assist with cold cases. N.H. is everything a law enforcement officer should be, and the CT100 Club is honored to present him with the 2017 Lifetime Achievement Award.

Chisholm Trail 100 Club Award — Brian Jones

Somervell County Fire Department

Lieutenant Brian Jones is manager of the Somervell County Fire Department Hovercraft Program since it began in October 2016. The Hovercraft Program has been an enormous success, filling a sorely needed vacuum in a county whose main attraction is rivers. In 2016 Somervell County Fire Department was dispatched to the area where the Brazos River, Paluxy River and Squaw Creek merge together, recent rains had caused all three bodies of water to rise considerably. Dispatch advised of a young male that was clinging to a tree at that location. Somervell County responded with rescue and medical units to the scene. One of the responding units was the hovercraft, purchased in October earlier in the year, and headed by Lieutenant Jones. Units arrived on scene to find the young man clinging to a tree about 100 yards from the shoreline. He had floated on a tube to that location and attached a rope to a dislodged boat dock caught in the trees. Bystanders advised that he was unable to paddle back up the river and became tired and returned to the trees, fortunately he was wearing a life jacket. The hovercraft was deployed with Lt. Jones and Cpt. Spike Williams. They were able to successfully rescue the young man. In addition, Lt. Jones has made many successful rescues and, as hovercraft team manager, also been involved in multiple "missing persons" incidents. Brian Jones has been with the Somervell County Fire Department since October 2000. Brian and his wife, Mikala, have a three year old daughter, Emersyn, and are expecting another daughter, Sawyer, in September.

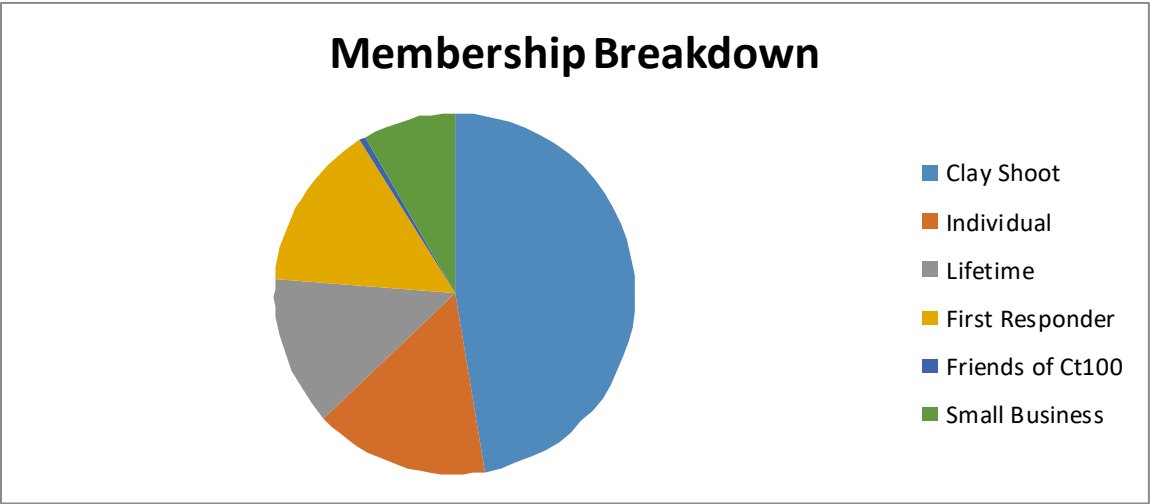

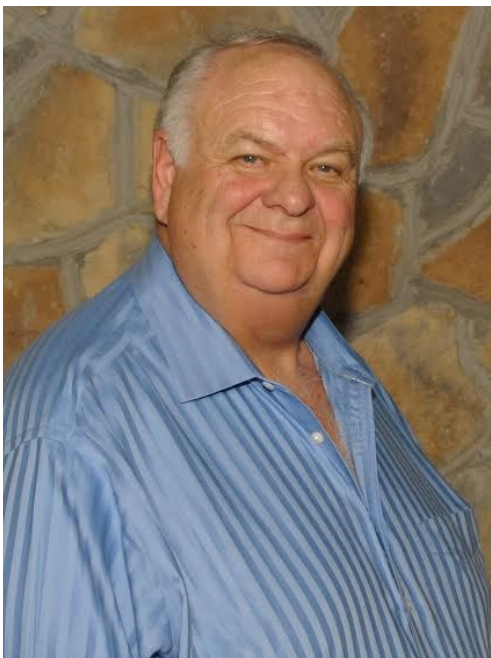
A 2001 graduate of the Texas A&M Engineering Extension

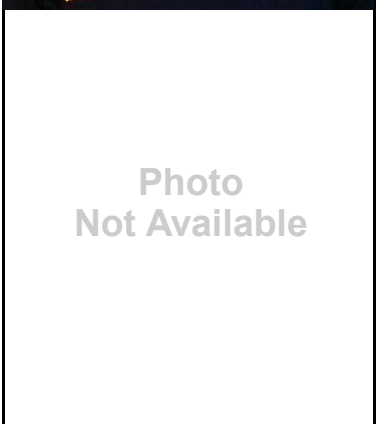

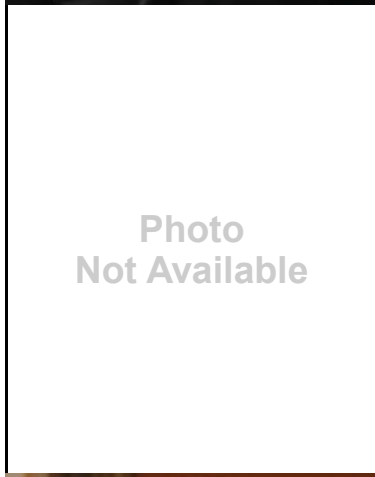
