Executive Summary

The Chisholm Trail 100 Club, Inc. is a growing network of people working together to provide financial support and encouragement to survivors of eligible law enforcement officers, fire-fighters, correctional officers and emergency medical service personnel who are killed or seriously injured in the line of duty within our area of operation, Johnson County and Somervell County, Texas. The Club is a citizen sponsored not-for-profit organization created to support the families of First Responder personnel and is funded only by its member dues (e.g. Annual memberships, Lifetime Memberships, etc.) and general donations from the public.

When tragedy strikes the effects can be both swift and devastating. The 100 Club recognizes the need to respond immediately with personal support and understanding. Whatever the need, be it financial, advisory, or moral support, the 100 Club will be there to ease the pain of the family of a firefighter, law enforcement officer, correctional officer or EMS (Emergency Medical Service) responder injured or killed in the line of duty.

Historical Background

The idea of the first 100 Club began in Detroit, Michigan, in 1952, after a local businessman, William Packer, was moved to action when a police officer was killed in the line of duty. Packer, a friend of the Police Commissioner, wrote to 100 of his friends, encouraging them to donate to a fund for the fallen officer's family to get them through the emotionally and financially trying time. The response was 100% positive. Packer and the Commissioner later met with the expectant widow, reviewed her finances, arranged to pay off the mortgage on their recently purchased home, pay all the bills, set up an education account for the yet unborn child and deposited \$7,000 in the widow's checking account.

These caring and unselfish actions became the charter for what is now nationally known as "The 100 Club". Over the last 50 years, 100 clubs have been started in cities in every state of the nation and members now number into the tens of thousands.

The Chisholm Trail 100 Club is the newest member to join the other Texas 100 Clubs: The 100 Club, The 100 Club of Southeast Texas and the 100 Club of Central Texas. As clubs grew, their missions expanded and changed. Many clubs have elected to include Fire Fighters and EMS Personnel; some have even begun providing stipends to qualified agencies to purchase equipment to enhance the safety of their personnel.

The 100 Club Members realize that money can never make up for the loss of or disability of a loved one, but it can be helpful in covering immediate expenses. In addition, the 100 Club has a committee of experts, a Professional Advisory Team including members of the Fallen Officers' Agency, CPAs, attorneys, trust officers, brokers, financial consultants and employee benefits consultants. This team, at the survivor's request, will advise and counsel the family in a wide range of areas without cost or obligation.

If you are a civic minded individual and support the 100 Club mission, there is a place for you among this group of extraordinary people. Membership in the 100 Club is open to everyone and provides minimum effort and maximum satisfaction. We simply want to help those who are always there to protect us.



# A Letter From Our President

Welcome to our 6<sup>th</sup> annual meeting of our Chisholm Trail 100 Club. I want to thank every one of you for the tremendous support you have shown to our first responders and the CT100 Club. Together, with your support we are able to provide resources to first responder families in the event our community experiences a line of duty death or serious injury of a first responder.

I also would like to thank our dedicated Board of Directors, Advisors and our Executive Director Niki Passmore. The tremendous growth of the CT100 Club is a direct result of the hard work and leadership of this dedicated team.

Enclosed in this annual report are the financial records of The Chisholm Trail 100 Club. In 2014, you entrusted me to be the President of this great organization. At that meeting, I challenged the organization and set a goal of doubling the financial resources of the CT100 Club. Two years later, I am very proud to announce that together we have met that goal. In 2014, our annual report showed the club with assets of \$204,017. Today, our assets as reported in our annual report are \$409,947. This past year, we achieved many other milestones through the hard work and leadership of our board and the generosity of our members and partners;

In 2014, our keynote speaker John Calandro challenged us to start a scholarship for the children of the fallen. Today, we have The John Calandro Scholarship with over \$98,000 for that very purpose. Thank you John Calandro for all of your help and efforts on behalf of the CT100 Club.

This past year through the generosity of Mike and Angie Erinakes, we started the MAAD Venture Capital Scholarship which provides scholarship opportunities for children of active first responders in our coverage area. This partnership allows the CT100 Club to help our active first responders without taking funds away from our mission as a 100 Club. The CT100 Club now covers first responders in Somervell County. We successfully raised the required funds to adopt this new area into our CT100 family. Coverage began in Somervell on May 1<sup>st</sup> of this year.

The CT100 Club is actively raising funds to expand our coverage area in order to cover the City of Mansfield first responders for those areas outside of Johnson County. I am confident that moving forward, we will fully achieve this goal as well.

As you can see, The Chisholm Trail 100 Club has a bright future ahead. We continue to pray that our services will never be needed, but history has shown that the world is a dangerous place and that our first responders put their lives on the line day in and day out to protect and serve us. Please continue your support The Chisholm Trail 100 Club through your membership, donations and dedication as we support our first responders.

# Mission Statement

Chisholm Trail 100 Club, Inc. is a growing network of people working together to provide financial support and encouragement to dependents of law enforcement officers, firefighters, correctional officers and emergency medical personnel who are killed or injured in the line of duty in the following manner:

1. To provide financial assistance to dependents of law enforcement officers, firefighters, correctional officers and emergency medical personnel killed in the course of a law enforcement or firefighting activity.
2. To provide financial assistance to a law enforcement officer, firefighter, correctional officer or emergency medical personnel that incurs a serious bodily injury or becomes disabled in the course of a law enforcement or firefighting activity.
3. To provide scholarships to approved applicants for educational purposes.



# Meet Our Award Winners

## Lifetime Achievement Award—Bill Hardin



Bill Hardin, at 93 years old, is the longest serving law enforcement officer in the state of Texas, serving nearly 70 years. He began his career in the City of Fort Worth in 1947 as a traffic officer. In 1952 he worked as a mounted patrol in the Fort Worth Stockyards, there he suffered a serious line of duty accident—he was hit by a car while directing traffic, suffering a broken thumb and three dislocated vertebrae, something that still affects him to this day. He then went on to the Narcotics Department in 1957. Hardin was named Officer of the Year in 1965. He retired from the Fort Worth Police Department in 1985 and then went to work for the Tarrant County Sheriff’s Office at the county jail. In 1993 he retired from that department as well, and then went to volunteer for the Johnson County Sheriff’s Department, where he works grand jury meetings and other special events. He has now served the Johnson County community for over 23 years, asking for nothing in return. We are so proud to honor this man’s commitment to law enforcement and his community.

## Chisholm Trail 100 Club Award—Robert Sigler Cleburne Police Department

Corporal Robert Sigler is being honored with the Chisholm Trail 100 Club Award for his actions on Friday, November 6, 2015. On that date Cpl Sigler responded to a reported motor vehicle crash at Main and Industrial in which a motorcycle was struck by a vehicle. Upon arrival, he located the driver of the motorcycle on the ground with severe open fractures and lacerations to his leg and life threatening active bleeding. Immediately recognizing the need to stop the bleeding and without hesitation, Cpl Sigler retrieved a tourniquet from his patrol vehicle and properly applied the tourniquet to the victim’s injured leg, stopping the active bleeding. This action was performed in the roadway of a busy intersection in the early morning light and with placing the immediate needs of the victim above his own personal safety. Cpl Sigler’s quick thinking and application of his training resulted in saving the victim’s life and most probably the victim’s limb. Trauma surgeons from John Peter Smith Hospital called the PD later in the day and stated that the rapid application of the tourniquet to the victim’s leg by Cpl Sigler resulted in saving his life from blood loss. The family of the victim also called to thank Cpl Sigler and stated that they, too, were told by the trauma surgeons that the tourniquet applied by the officer saved their loved one. They expressed their deepest gratitude.

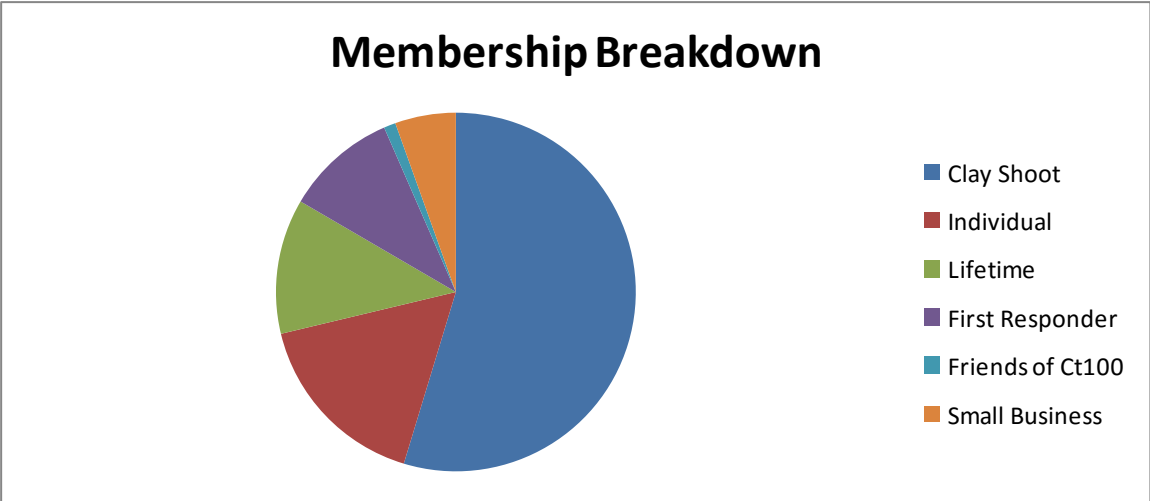

# Chisholm Trail 100 Club Award—Troy Fuller

**Johnson County Sheriff's Department**

Captain Troy Fuller is being honored with the Chisholm Trail 100 Club Award for courage in the line of duty. Captain Fuller has served with the Johnson County Sheriff's Department for 20 years. On November 27, 2015 the Johnson County Sheriff's Department received a call about a high water rescue, which later turned into a recovery in the Rock Creek area, which was swollen by 10-12 feet with water. After Fuller was out on the rescue he began having pain behind his



knee cap, which was later diagnosed as a charcot fracture (a separation of the bone and the upper part of the foot, where the bones become dislodged). Fuller was admitted to the hospital and doctors determined he had a severe fracture and bone infection, recommending an amputation below the knee. So far the operation has been successful at keeping the infection from affecting the rest of his body. Captain Fuller has dealt with some significant challenges and life changes this year, all in the name of service to the community he serves. He plans to return to work as soon as possible and continues to recover from his injuries.

The Chisholm Trail 100 Club made a \$1,000 disbursement to assist Captain Fuller with his injuries.

# Meet Our First Scholarship Recipient Payton Alley—Burleson High School

The Chisholm Trail 100 Club is proud to announce the selection of Burleson High School Senior Payton Alley as the first recipient of its MAAD Venture Capital Group, Inc. scholarship. The scholarship which is underwritten by MAAD Venture Capital Group, Inc. and administered by Chisholm Trail 100 Club has an award value of \$1000 for the first year and the opportunity to be renewable for three additional years if qualification are met.
